Special visit to an important ancient Shinto shrine and over 150 items of cultural importance

Iwashimizu Hachimangu Shrine lies in the mountains of Otokoyama where calls of wild birds reverberate in the air. This tour brings you away from the hustle and bustle of Kyoto city to an ancient Shinto shrine that is also one of Japan's designated national treasures. We will explore its shrine halls that were constructed 300 to 400 years ago, guided by a priest who will tell us more about the shrine's history. Before leaving, we will receive an "ema" (a wooden plaque for writing one's prayers or wishes) with the shrine's unique design as a souvenir from our visit.

Named after the holy water ("iwashimizu") flowing from the midsection of Mt. Otokoyama, lwashimizu Hachimangu Shrine is one of Japan's three major Hachimangu shrines, along with Usa Jingu Shrine in Kyushu and Tsurugaoka Hachimangu Shrine in Kanto.



The shrine grounds are home to several sites of tremendous historical importance, including numerous cultural treasures dating from more than 1000 years ago that have been carefully preserved and handed down through the generations.



More than 150 stunning engravings showcasing the shrine's magnificence in vivid colors can be found on the fence paneling that surrounds the shrine's main hall. We will learn more about these decorative works from the priest during the guided tour.



The stone paved approach connecting the third torii gate to the main hall. In the vicinity of the third torii gate, we will find a protruding rock called "Shobuishi" where we will gather together to pray.



Once a year in spring, the shrine welcomes visitors at night. During this special event, the main hall will be illuminated and open to the public, with many important cultural assets on display. Activities such as guided tours of the hall and open-air tea ceremonies will also be held.

Experience the heart of Japanese tea culture amidst the beautiful seasonal scenery of the surrounding garden

"Shokado Bento," a boxed lunch that exemplifies Japanese cuisine, has its roots in "Shokado"—a residential complex where high-ranking monks in the past have spent the last years of their lives in the company of sprawling gardens with the occasional tea room or study. This tour brings you to "Shokado," where you will sit down for a tea ceremony. Immerse yourself in this rich cultural experience while enjoying the beautiful seasonal scenery of the surrounding garden.

Shokado Garden shares a deep affinity with the Buddhist priest Shokado Shojo, who was active in the early Edo period as a leading figure of the elegant Kan'ei culture. This garden houses a number of culturally important sites within its huge area of 22,000 square meters, including the tea hut "Shokado" and an ancient study "Izumibo Shoin," which combine with the surrounding Japanese gardens to create a stunning landscape.



When seated in the "Bai-in," you can hear the enchanting sounds of water drops emanating from the nearby "Sulkinkulsu" (water lyre cave) beside a stone wash basin. As the seasons go by, the garden offers refreshing views of camellia, plum blossoms, cherry blossoms, and maple leaves.



We will sit down for a formal tea ceremony in the tea room "Chiku-in." All beginners are welcome to participate and enjoy this essential cultural experience.

Shokado Garden is the birthplace of the well-known Shokado Bento, a mainstay in Japanese cuisine. You can enjoy your lunch while taking in the delightful backdrop of the surrounding garden.



The collection at Shokado Art Museum features many works related to Shokado Shojo. The museum also regularly holds special exhibitions and themed exhibitions. You can contact them for more details.

Experience tea harvesting at a tea plantation, and savor green tea of the highest quality at a tea factory

This tour offers a complete tea experience that is also popular with tourists on sites like TripAdvisor. We will tour a plantation along Kizugawa river known for cultivating high-quality tea leaves, where we will harvest tea by hand. After that, we will visit a tea factory and savor the exceptional taste of high-quality green tea that is made using techniques unique to this area. This tour allows you to experience something so rare that it eludes even most native Japanese people.

Joyo City is one of the few regions nationwide that cultivate Tencha—tea leaves that are ground into fine powder to produce matcha. At the National Tea Fair where the quality of different matcha is judged, Joyo City has twice beaten other tea-producing regions to the top prize (in 2015 and 2017). Magouemon owns many tea fields and tea factories in this prime region that has the perfect conditions for tea cultivation.



Tencha grown near the dried riverbed of Kizugawa river is known as "Hama-cha," a premium variant that is highly prized by tea wholesalers. We will tour the tea plantations and harvest tea leaves by hand. Cancelled in case of rain.



We will then visit one of the very few Tencha factories in Japan to witness how freshly picked tea leaves are processed to make matcha powder.



We will savor the taste of high-quality green tea made by the "Honzu method," a tea processing technique unique to this region. The matcha's bright green color, elegant aroma, and profound depth of flavor attest to the unmatched quality of the tea.



When matcha is served during the tea ceremony, there will be a short talk on Magouemon's method of preparing matcha. You will also get to try making matcha yourself.

Iwashimizu Hachimangu Shrine

Presiding over the southwest gate of the city, this is the most important shrine in the country after Ise Jingu. Its main hall, the oldest in Japan, is a national treasure built with the unique method known as "Hachimanzukuri"

•Byodo-in Temple "Phoenix Hall"

A UNESCO World Heritage site. Enjoy the splendor of this important Heian Dynasty Buddhist temple.

Fushimi Inari Shrine

An Instagram hotspot that always ranks highly on TripAdvisor, largely for its photogenic corridor of red torii gates. Worshippers gather here to pray for good harvests, business prosperity, family safety, and other wishes.

Mampuku-ji Temple

Founded in 1661 by Chinese zen master Yin-yuan, this ancient Buddhist temple features a distinctly Chinese style of architecture, Vegetarian Chinese fucha ryori meals can also be sampled at its on-site restaurant.

Fukujuen Ujicha Kobo

Here you can enjoy Uji's tea culture, through tea-making, tea tasting, dining, and shopping for souvenirs.

Asahiyaki Shop & Gallery

Purchase your favorite earthenware at the Asahi pottery, one of the historically important Enshu Nakagama potteries

Tsuen Chaya Tea House

The oldest tea house in Japan, located on the east side of the Uji bridge, with origins dating back to 1160. Its current building was constructed in 1672 during the beginning of the Edo Period and contains a wooden carving of its 1st generation owner, by renowned Zen monk Ikkyu Sojun. You can enjoy freshly milled matcha-infused green tea desserts and sweets here.

•Horii Shichimeien

During the Muromachi era, General Ashikaga designated seven Uji tea plantations as the elite "Shichimeien". This is the only one remaining today. Special tea made from the leaves grown here can be enjoyed in the tea room.

Founded in 1661 by Chinese zen master Yin-yuan, this ancient Buddhist temple features a distinctly Chinese style of architecture. Vegetarian Chinese fucha ryori meals can also be sampled at its on-site restaurant.

Komano Ashikage-en Ruins

A stone monument celebrating the origin of Uji tea, and the legend that the Buddhist monk Myoe taught the Uji villagers how to plant tea.

Fucha cuisine

This vegetarian Buddhist cuisine was brought from China by the High Priest Ingen. Its name, fucha, means "to bring tea and the masses together"

Shuon-an Ikkyu-ji Temple

A temple with a Japanese rock garden where the monk lkkyu spent his last years.

Omido Kannon-ji Temple

A temple where you can see the eleven Kannon statues and receive many divine blessings.

•Kaijusen-ji Temple

The 17.7m tall five-storey pagoda, the only one built during the Kamakura period, is a national treasure which used to house statues of the four heavenly kings (the statues are currently entrusted to the Nara National Museum. The inside of the five-storey pagoda and the statues of the four heavenly kings are usually closed to the public.) The temple offers sweeping views across to Mt. Kongo and Mt. Katsuragi.

Kunikvo Ruins

About 1300 years ago, Emperor Shomu ordered the construction of the Kuni-Kyo palace in Kizugawa, which briefly became the country's capital between 740 and 744. By visiting these ancient ruins, you are able to get a sense that this corner of Japan played a pivotal role in Japanese history.

Joruri-ji Temple

This temple is located in the Tono area, near the border with Nara Prefecture. Its main hall, itself a national treasure, houses nine statues of sitting Amida Nyorai (national treasures), and statues of the four heavenly kings (national treasures).* Repairs of the nine Amida Nyorai sitting statues, begun in 2018, will take five years to complete

Gansen-ji Temple

Located in the Tono area near the border with Nara Prefecture, this temple delights visitors with its stunning natural setting. Surrounded by verdant green for much of the year, fiery red leaves in the fall, and a forest of blooming hydrangeas at the beginning of the summer.

Tono Buddha Statues / Miroku no Tsuji

Strongly influenced by Nanto Rokushu Buddhism, hermit monks carved a series of Buddhist reliefs into rocks during the Kamakura period (1185-1333), These stone Buddhas now mark the pilgrim trail through the Tono-no-sato area.

With more than 70 canoes, this is Japan's largest canoe school, ideally suited for beginners due to its proximity to the gentle currents of the Kizugawa river. After a short lesson to pick up the basics, you have the opportunity to paddle down a 6km stretch of the river.

Enjoy a panoramic view of the Nishinoyama group of lea plantations known as the "Ujitawara Soen" village. In spring, you can also witness the leaves being harvested.

Soen Koyuan Yantan

This is the hub for tourism exchange in Ujitawara Town. Here you can experience various tea-related programs and buy local products and fine teas produced by local growers.

Nagatani Soen House

This is the birthplace of Nagatani Soen, who during the middle of the Edo period, developed and popularised a process of rolling and drying sencha lea leaves known as the "aosei sencha" method – which remains the basis for tea manufacturing in Japan to this day.

Inside are the valuable remains of a kiln which was used for tea making.

Chaso-myo Shrine

In 1954, Nagatani Soen was enshrined in the formerly-named Daijingu shrine as its Chasomyo deity. Its moss-covered torii gate, stone fence, and surrounding forest alude a sacred, mysterious almosphere.

The beautiful circular terraced lea fields hugging the hills of the Ishitera area are interspersed with both old and new dwellings, typifying the Chagenkyo landscape. (Designated a scenic asset of Kyoto Prefecture)

This café serves many functions, including acting as a base for sightseeing in Wazuka Town, selling Wazuka-cha tea, renting bicycles, and more.

Near the summit of Mt. Jubuzan is Kontai-ji temple, a sacred mountain spot, said to have been founded by En-no-Ozuno around the end of the seventh century. The Tokai Nature Trail connects the temple to the Harayama district of Wazuka Town, whose beautiful curved tea plantations are typical of the Chagenkyo landscape.

Please note: The mountain trail from Ujitawara is steep and requires sufficient preparation. Furthermore, the training area is a place for practicing monks, and entering it can be dangerous.

Between Gansen-ji Temple and Joruri-ji Temples, remain several stone Buddhist statues and reliefs, created by hermit monks influenced by Nanto Rokushu Buddhism. Take a walk along the trail dotted with the stone Buddhas, and pass by village stores hanging seasonal produce outside.

Joruri-ji Temple

Its main hall, itself a national treasure, houses nine statues of sitting Amida Nyorai (National treasures), and statues of the four heavenly kings (National treasures).* Repairs of the nine Amida Nyorai sitting statues, begun in 2018, will take five years to complete.

Tono Buddha Statues / Miroku no Tsuji

This local farmers market sells Kumiyama-grown fresh fruit and vegetables, rice, cut flowers, and processed goods. This is Kumiyama's hub for promoting local food production and consumption, where fresh seasonal kyo-yasai (Kyoto vegetables) can be enjoyed year-round.


